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# INTRODUCTION

This publication is a comprehensive collection of summaries for bills that were referred to the Assembly Committee on Communications and Conveyance during the 2021-2022 legislative session. This includes bills that were signed into law, vetoed by the Governor, held in committee, and bills that were referred and later amended to address a different subject matter.

Each summary includes the final status of the bill in italics. Bills that the Legislature passed and the Governor signed into law are listed along with their chapter numbers. In general, chaptered legislation will go into effect on January 1st of the following year. Bills that contain an urgency clause (not noted in this document) took effect immediately upon the Governor's signature.

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## **Assembly Bills**

### **AB 14 (Aguiar-Curry) Communications: California Advanced Services Fund: deaf and disabled telecommunications program: surcharge.**

**Summary:** This bill extends the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) program until 2032 to encourage deployment of broadband service to unserved Californians. The bill also revises the surcharge collection methodology for interconnected Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) service and the Deaf and Disabled Telecommunications Program (DDTP).

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. Chapter 658, Statutes of 2021.

### **AB 34 (Muratsuchi) Broadband for All Act of 2022.**

**Summary:** This bill, known as the Broadband for All Act of 2022, would have required voters to be asked to authorize the issuance of \$10 billion in general obligation bonds to fund the 2022 Broadband for All Program. The Broadband for All Program would have funded several broadband initiatives including infrastructure deployment and affordability.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

### **AB 41 (Wood) Broadband infrastructure deployment.**

**Summary:** This bill requires the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) to install conduit for fiber communications lines as part of projects to build a state-owned middle-mile broadband network. This bill also requires the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to update broadband maps to specified information about local broadband service.

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. *Chapter 659, Statutes of 2021.*

### **AB 74 (Lorena Gonzalez) Communications: universal service: lifeline program.**

**Summary:** This bill requires the CPUC to make various changes to the enrollment and recertification process for California's Lifeline (Lifeline) program.

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. *Chapter 410, Statutes of 2021.*

### **AB 270 (Ramos) Core Behavioral Health Crisis Services System.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established the Core Behavioral Health Crisis Services System (CBHCSS), a state suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline system. The CBHCSS would have been funded by an end-user surcharge on California voice service bills.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Health.

### **AB 537 (Quirk) Communications: wireless telecommunications and broadband facilities.**

**Summary:** This bill updates existing law establishing a timeline and process by which wireless telecommunication siting facility permits will be deemed approved.

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. Chapter 467, Statutes of 2021.

**AB 660 (Cooper) Department of Motor Vehicles: records: pull-notice system.**

**Summary:** This bill would have added additional companies to the list of entities eligible and required to enroll in the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Employer Pull Notice program (EPN).

**Status:** Hearing postponed by Author in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 955 (Quirk) Highways: encroachment permits: broadband facilities.**

**Summary:** This bill establishes additional requirements for the Department of Transportation (Caltrans) when it reviews an application for an encroachment permit for a broadband facility.

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. Chapter 670, Statutes of 2021.

**AB 988 (Bauer-Kahan) Mental health: 988 crisis hotline.**

**Summary:** This bill establishes the Miles Hall Lifeline Act (Act), establishing 988 Crisis Hotline Center for the purpose of connecting individuals experiencing a mental health crisis with suicide prevention and mental health services. Additionally, this bill establishes a surcharge on voice service in California to fund the program. Furthermore, this bill requires the California Health and Human Services Agency (CalHHS) to create a set of recommendations to support a five-year implementation plan for a comprehensive 988 system.

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. Chapter 747, Statutes of 2022.

**AB 1100 (Aguiar-Curry) Communications service: disasters: reports.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the CPUC to collect specified information related to the damage, repair, restoration, and backup generation of telecommunications infrastructure caused by a fire or other disaster.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 1128 (Ramos) Communications: California High-Cost Fund-B Administrative Committee Fund program.**

**Summary:** This bill would have expanded the California High-Cost Fund-B (CHCF-B) program to also promote the affordability and widespread availability of advanced services, including broadband internet access service.

**Status:** Held at request of Author in the Assembly Committee on Communications and Conveyance.

**AB 1166 (Grayson) Communications: wireless telecommunications facilities.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established a process and timeline for a city or county to approve or deny a collocation or siting application for wireless telecommunications facilities.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Local Government.

**AB 1176 (Eduardo Garcia) Communications: universal broadband service: California Connect Fund.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established the California Connect Fund and Program to ensure that high-speed broadband service is available to every household in the state at affordable rates.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 1257 (Patterson) Small independent telephone corporations: ratemaking.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established alternative dispute resolution requirements for small independent telephone corporation rate cases.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 1349 (Mathis) California Advanced Services Fund: Broadband Adoption Account.**

**Summary:** This bill would have added nonprofit religious organizations to the list of groups eligible for grant funding from the CASF Broadband Adoption subaccount.

**Status:** Ordered to Assembly Inactive File at the request of the Author.

**AB 1425 (Gipson) California Advanced Services Fund: Broadband Public Housing Account.**

**Summary:** This bill would have re-established the Broadband Public Housing Account subaccount within the CASF to fund broadband connectivity for publicly-subsidized housing communities. This bill would have required the CPUC to annually allocate \$25 million from the CASF to the new Broadband Public Housing Account.

**Status:** Held the Assembly Committee on Appropriations

**AB 1426 (Mathis) California Advanced Services Fund.**

**Summary:** This bill eliminates existing law allowing an incumbent internet service provider (ISP) to block CASF broadband infrastructure grants to areas where the ISP intends to expand service.

**Status:** Approved by the Governor. Chapter 946, Statutes of 2022.

**AB 1483 (Patterson) California Broadband Council: duties.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the California Broadband Council to ensure that all relevant state agencies are made aware of actions necessary to fully implement recommendations in the “2020 Broadband for All Action Plan.”

**Status:** Hearing postponed by Author in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 1557 (Santiago) Communications: utility pole attachments.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established a process by which a public utility must respond to requests for pole attachment from a cable television corporation.

**Status:** Held at the request of the Author in the Assembly Committee on Communications and Conveyance.



**AB 1669 (Cunningham) California Internet Consumer Protection and Net Neutrality Act of 2018: United States Department of Veterans Affairs: telehealth applications.**

**Summary:** This bill would have exempted digital telehealth applications administered by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) from existing internet consumer protection and net neutrality law prohibiting zero-rating.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee Communications and Conveyance.

**AB 1934 (Rodriguez) Office of Emergency Services: broadband communications grant program: fairgrounds**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) to establish a grant program to provide fairs with grant funding for purposes of building and upgrading broadband communication infrastructure on fairgrounds.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 1988 (Bauer-Kahan) Warren-911-Emergency Assistance Act and Miles Hall-988-Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Lifeline.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established a 988 mental health crisis hotline system in state government, to be referred to as the Miles Hall Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Lifeline.

**Status:** Ordered to Assembly Inactive File at the request of the Author.

**AB 2066 (Seyarto) Communication: telegraph corporations, telegraphy, and telegrams.**

**Summary:** This bill would have struck references to the terms “telegraph” or “telegram” in various statutes in various code sections of law. This bill also would have updated various statutes to include gender-neutral language.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 2252 (Aguiar-Curry) Broadband infrastructure: disasters: reports.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to collect specified information from broadband service providers following a Governor declared state or local disaster, and annually share that information with the Legislature.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 2256 (Quirk-Silva) Office of Broadband and Digital Literacy: reports.**

**Summary:** This bill adds an additional member to the Middle-Mile Advisory Committee (MMAC). Requires that the additional member be a city, county, or city and county elected government official. Provides that the additional member shall be appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly and shall serve at pleasure of the Speaker of the Assembly.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 779, Statutes of 2022

**AB 2635 (Levine) Digital Infrastructure and Video Competition Act of 2006: public, educational, and government access channels.**

**Summary:** : This bill would have required public, educational, and governmental access (PEG) channels to be retransmitted by holders of a state franchise in the same quality and format in which it was received. The bill also would have required SVF holders to carry PEG channels in both high-definition and standard definition formats.

**Status:** Failed passage on Assembly Floor.

**AB 2641 (Gipson) California Emerging Technology Fund: focus and funding priorities.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the CPUC to revise the focus of the California Emerging Technology Fund to focus on closing the digital divide, promoting digital inclusion, and achieving digital equity by assisting nonprofit community-based organizations that provide services to help low-income residents find a pathway out of poverty, including through access to the internet and proficiency in digital literacy skills.

**Status:** Held at the request of the Author in the Assembly Committee on Communications and Conveyance.

**AB 2702 (Gipson) California Advanced Services Fund: Broadband Public Housing Account.**

**Summary:** This bill would have made various changes to the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) Broadband Public Housing Account (PHA) including setting a goal for the account, prioritizing specified types of grants, requiring a streamlined application process, and requiring a minimum budget allocation upon appropriation by the legislature.

**Status:** Held in Senate Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 2716 (Grayson) Transportation network companies: participating drivers: safety courses.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required a transportation network company (TNC), on and after July 1, 2023, to require drivers to complete a safety course every 2 years. The bill also would have required the safety course to be provided at no cost to a driver and include a minimum set of specified training topics.

**Status:** Vetoed by Governor.

**AB 2732 (Mullin) Emergency Telephone Users Surcharge Act: Next Generation 911.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required that a vendor for any Next Generation 911 (NG911) systems and subsequent technologies be based in the United States.

**Status:** Held in Assembly Emergency Management Committee.

**AB 2748 (Holden) Telecommunications: Digital Equity in Video Franchising Act of 2022.**

**Summary:** This bill would have made comprehensive changes to state law pertaining to cable operators and state video franchising including revising the renewal process for a state-issued video franchise, updating anti-discrimination requirements, requiring holders of a SVF holders to provide equal access to service, and revising requirements for remittance of franchise fees to local governments.

**Status:** Hearing cancelled at the request of the Author in Senate Energy, Utilities and Communications Committee.

**AB 2749 (Quirk-Silva) Communications: California Advanced Services Fund.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the CPUC to review California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) grant applications within 120 days, and provides that applications are deemed approved if the commission does not deny the application or meet the 120 day deadline. The bill also requires the CPUC to allow a streamlined reimbursement process for some grant recipients.

**Status:** Vetoed by Governor.

**AB 2750 (Mia Bonta) Department of Technology: state digital equity plan.**

**Summary:** This bill requires the California Department of Technology (CDT) to develop a state digital equity plan by January 1, 2024. The bill requires that the plan include, among other things, the identification of barriers to digital equity faced by specified populations, as provided, and measurable objectives towards achieving digital equity among those populations.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 597, Statutes of 2022

**AB 2751 (Eduardo Garcia) Affordable Internet and Net Equality Act of 2022.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the California Department of Technology (CDT) to develop and establish the Net Equality Program to ensure the state and state agencies shall only do business with an internet service provider (ISP) that offers affordable home internet service, as specified.

**Status:** Failed passage in Senate Governmental Organization Committee.

**AB 2752 (Wood) Broadband infrastructure and video service: mapping: subscriber information.**

**Summary:** This bill clarifies the data that the CPUC must collect for mapping broadband access. The bill specifies that the CPUC may collect information from broadband service providers at the address level for the purposes of existing broadband mapping requirements. The bill prohibits the CPUC from disclosing personal consumer information protected by existing customer right of privacy law, and clarifies that “actual locations” for which cable franchises must report service data includes addresses.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 801, Statutes of 2022

**AB 2753 (Reyes) Communications: Digital Equity Bill of Rights.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established the Digital Equity Bill of Rights, which pertains to broadband and is applicable to all residents of the state. This bill also requires the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to ensure that all residents of the state benefit from equal access to broadband internet service and directs the CPUC to adopt rules, as specified.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**AB 2905 (Patterson) Office of Broadband and Digital Literacy: reports.**

**Summary:** This bill would have provided that the report submitted annually to the budget committees of the Legislature shall be subject to the same requirements as a report that is submitted to Members of either house of the Legislature generally and shall be submitted in compliance with those provisions.

**Status:** Held at the request of the Author in the Assembly Committee on Communications and Conveyance.

**AB 2906 (Patterson) Telecommunications: automatic dialing-announcing devices: pupil health and safety exemption.**

**Summary:** This bill exempts persons contacting parents or guardians of pupils on behalf of a school, using automatic dialing-announcing devices, from specific prohibitions on the use of those devices.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 36, Statutes of 2022

**HR 125 (Reyes) Communications**

**Summary:** Urges the United States (U.S) Congress to pass and the President of the United States to sign, legislation dedicating a substantial portion of future spectrum auction proceeds to endow a mission-driven Digital Equity Foundation to make sustainable investments in digital literacy and inclusion.

**Status:** Adopted.

## **Senate Bills**

### **SB 4 (Gonzalez) Communications: California Advanced Services Fund.**

**Summary:** This bill extends the operation of the California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) through 2032, increases the annual funding cap for the CASF, and expands projects eligible for CASF grants to include fund broadband deployment at unserved locations used for emergency response.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 671, Statutes of 2021.

### **SB 28 (Caballero) Digital Infrastructure and Video Competition Act of 2006: deployment data.**

**Summary:** This bill expands the authority of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to collect data to enforce requirements for cable franchises and authorizes the CPUC to set customer service requirements for cable providers.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 673, Statutes of 2021.

### **SB 66 (Allen) California Council on the Future of Transportation: advisory committee: autonomous vehicle technology.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the Secretary of the California Transportation Agency (CalSTA) to establish the California Council on the Future of Transportation, to make recommendations to the Legislature and to the Governor regarding changes in state policy regarding autonomous vehicles.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

### **SB 341 (McGuire) Telecommunications service: outages.**

**Summary:** This bill requires the CPUC to establish resiliency plans for backup power requirements for certain telecommunications providers to ensure that service can be maintained for at least 72 hours during an electrical outage. This bill also requires certain telecommunications providers to establish and maintain public outage maps on their websites, and it requires the Office of Emergency Services (OES) to adopt requirements for public outage maps established and maintained by telecommunications providers.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 425, Statutes of 2021.

### **SB 378 (Gonzalez) Local government: broadband infrastructure development project permit processing: microtrenching permit processing ordinance.**

**Summary:** This bill requires local governments to allow fiber installers to use microtrenching as a method for installing fiber unless the local government makes a specified finding that permitting microtrenching would adversely impact public health and safety.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 677, Statutes of 2021.

### **SB 394 (Hueso) Telecommunications: Moore Universal Telephone Service Act.**

**Summary:** This bill modifies the definition of a "household" for the purposes of determining eligibility for the Lifeline program. This bill clarifies that individuals with the

same physical address can have separate Lifeline subscriptions if they are separate economic units.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 765, Statutes of 2021.

**SB 500 (Min) Autonomous vehicles: zero emissions.**

**Summary:** This bill requires, commencing January 1, 2030, to the extent authorized by federal law, any autonomous vehicle of model year of 2031 or later and a gross vehicle weight rating of less than 8,501 pounds shall only be operated if it is a zero-emission vehicle.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 277, Statutes of 2021.

**SB 546 (Wilk) Communications: lifeline universal service.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the CPUC to continue the foster youth program, initiated by the CPUC as the iFoster pilot program, as an element of the Lifeline program, to subsidize the cost of smartphones and monthly service to eligible foster youth, and provides parameters and authorities to the CPUC in administering the program.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations

**SB 556 (Dodd) Street light poles, traffic signal poles: small wireless facilities attachments.**

**Summary:** This bill would have established permitting requirements for the placement of small wireless facilities on street light and traffic signal poles owned by local governments, including specified timelines for approving and attaching infrastructure, limitations on fees for attachments, and restrictions on local governments' ability to prohibit small wireless facility attachments.

**Status:** Vetoed by Governor.

**SB 589 (Hueso) Air pollution: alternative vehicles and vehicle infrastructure.**

**Summary:** This bill expands the types of projects eligible for funding from the Alternative and Renewable Fuel and Vehicle Technology Program (ARFVTP) to include projects that develop in-state supply chains and the workforce for raw materials and components needed for zero-emission vehicle (ZEV) manufacturing. This bill expands the groups the California Energy Commission (CEC) must consult as part of ARFVTP workforce development efforts to include the California Conservation Corps, local Conservation Corps, the California Mobility Center, and the California Community Colleges,. This bill also incorporates workforce development as a resource the CEC must evaluate part of its regular assessment of resources needed to meet state ZEV deployment goals.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 732, Statutes of 2021.

**SB 743 (Bradford) Housing developments: broadband adoption: grant program.**

**Summary:** This bill would have required the CPUC to establish and administer a grant program to fund broadband adoption, digital literacy and computer equipment for any

publicly supported community, low-income mobile park or farmworker housing. The bill does not provide funding for the grant program.

**Status:** Held in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

**SB 717 (Dodd) Department of Technology: broadband communications: report.**

**Summary:** This bill would direct the Office of Planning and Research (OPR), on or before January 1, 2024, to submit a report to the legislature that reviews and identifies barriers to and opportunities for the expansion of broadband access points and broadband service in various locations and to various communities.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 813, Statutes of 2022

**SB 857 (Hueso) Telecommunications: universal service programs.**

**Summary:** This bill extends the authorization for the California High Cost Fund (CHCF) A and B programs through January 1, 2028.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 706, Statutes of 2022

**SB 1008 (Becker) Corrections: communications.**

**Summary:** This bill requires state and local correctional facilities to provide voice communication services to incarcerated persons free of charge. This bill also designates certain communication service providers as a public utility and requires the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to establish service quality standards for those communication service providers.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 827, Statutes of 2022

**SB 1208 (Hueso) Low-income utility customer assistance programs: concurrent application process.**

**Summary:** This bill requires the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to develop a concurrent application process to enable a customer to apply, or begin to apply, to multiple low-income customer assistance programs.

**Status:** Approved by Governor. Chapter 840, Statutes of 2022
